
M.A.C.'s Behavior Expectations

*K-2nd grade teachers will start using McKeel Systems to document when students do not meet behavior expectations. This mimics the infractions used by 3rd-6th grades.

*An automated email will be sent out that afternoon so parents are aware of their child's behavior and can discuss it at home.

*The goal is to provide a consistent communication tool from school to home and track specific behavior concerns with the hope of seeing an improvement in student behavior.



Required Uniform

- Pants -- long navy blue or khaki
- Shorts -- navy blue or khaki (hemline should reach mid-thigh or lower)
- Shirts -- gray or burgundy with MAC block logo (Gr. K-6) or white with MAC block logo for Grades 5 and 6 only - Long or short-sleeved undershirts must be plain WHITE or GRAY only with no logo
- Skorts -- McKeel Academy Central plaid, navy or khaki skorts for Gr. K-6 (hemline should reach mid-thigh or lower)
- Tights and Leggings -- May be worn but must be full length covering the entire leg and WHITE, GRAY or BLACK only. NO CROPPED LEGGINGS ARE PERMITTED.
- Shoes -- Must have closed toe and closed back for safety purposes. No sandals, flip-flops, crocs, or roller shoes. Tennis shoes are REQUIRED for PE!
- Belts -- Must be worn and visible at all times with any bottoms that have belt loops

Behavior Expectation:

Follows uniform policy (continued)

- *Shirts are to be tucked in at all times
- *Skirts, skorts and shorts are not to be rolled up
- *Buckled belts must be visible and fastened properly
- *Body writing or fake tattoos must not be visible
- *Earrings: Ears only; no gauges allowed
- *Makeup: Makeup may be worn in natural tones only. (Grade 6 girls only)
- *Hair: Only naturally occurring hair colors will be permitted (no purple, green, orange, pink, etc.) Student's hair may not cover their eyes. Students are not allowed to have hairstyles that are considered distracting to the educational process and will be referred to the office. If you are unsure of acceptable styles, please contact an administrator before making the change to your child's hair
- *Backpacks: No offensive or disrespectful writing or drawing on outside. Rolling backpacks will not be permitted for safety purposes.


SHACK TIME

Attendance Policy

School begins at 8:15 a.m.

Students must be at school for at least 50% of the school day, or they will be marked as absent. (11:30 am)

Please hold onto any doctor's notes, as we will not collect them at school.

Upload Doctor's Notes: You can upload doctor's notes by logging into McKeel Systems and selecting "attendance". There is an option to "upload note". Please do not turn paper notes into the school.

Attendance Policy

Attendance Warning (10 or more unexcused absences):

After a student has accumulated 10 days of absences, tardies, or early checkouts the parent will receive an automated attendance message notifying them that their student has reached an excessive number of absences.

Attendance Contract (15 or more unexcused absences)

If a student reaches 15 **unexcused** absences, they will be placed on an attendance contract. A parent or guardian will be required to attend a meeting to review attendance expectations. The contract will remain in effect for the remainder of the school year. Students on an attendance contract may be unable to participate in extracurricular activities including field trips, field days and house days.

Ongoing attendance issues may lead to dismissal from McKeel Academy Central.

Arrival Information:

Students should be dropped off in the car line by 8:10 a.m. so that we can have all students in the classroom by 8:15 a.m. and ready for the start of the school day. Any student arriving after 8:15 a.m. is considered tardy.

1st 9 Weeks ONLY:

All reading assessments will be read to your child. This will assess their listening comprehension skills.

Remainder of the Year:

Students will be required to read passages and answer comprehension questions on their own. This will assess their independent reading comprehension.



Phonics First Program

This is a multisensory, systematic, structured, sequential, phonics-based, direct instruction that teaches students how to decode (read) and encode (spell).

Weekly lessons will teach students various spelling patterns throughout the year. Students will participate in daily activities to reinforce the weekly phonics skill.

Students will be given a spelling test each Friday to check for understanding of the weekly phonics skill. Students will also be given a sentence to dictate (write).

High Frequency Words

Red words are typically non-phonetic sight words that require memorization because they cannot be sounded out using phonetic rules. Students will be working on reading and spelling the red words.

Sight words provide an excellent base for reading at an early age. These words can be found frequently in a text. Sight words are typically words that students can recognize immediately and can read without having to decode (sound them out).


We will be using the red word and high frequency word first grade list this year.

Writing

Students will...

- write narratives to retell two or more sequenced events.
- write opinions about a topic with at least one supporting detail and a sense of closure.
- write expository texts about a topic, using a source, providing facts and a sense of closure.
- follow the rules of grammar, capitalization, punctuation, and spelling.

Math



Students will learn...

Numbers to 120 (count forward, backward, skip count by 2's, 5's, 10's)

- Place Value (tens/ones, greater than/less than)
- Addition & Subtraction (strategies, fluency, fact families, two-digit numbers, regrouping)
- Measurement (length in inches & centimeters)



Accelerated Reader (AR)

Accelerated Reader (AR) is a program we use to help encourage reading. Students can read a book and take a short comprehension quiz on the book. Based on their score, they will earn points.

- -For the first quarter, we will practice AR for fun.
- -Next nine weeks, your child will get his or her first goal. It is personalized to their reading level. Please encourage your child to read to make his or her goal. Students that make their goal will earn rewards. Students can also earn rewards for taking AR tests and doing well on them.
- -I will also be reading AR books to the class at school to help them make their goals.
 - -Your child will get a new goal each nine weeks.
- -Your child may use the book to help them on the AR test. AR tests can only be taken at school during school hours.
