

Fun Sight Word Games!!!

- Flatten out PlayDoh and use a wooden skewer to have your student write the sight word.
- Use PlayDoh to roll, shape, and build the sight word.
- Use magnets to build sight words on a magnetic tray or magnetic white board.
- Use river rocks (you can find at Dollar Store) and write letters on the rocks. Have your student sort through the rocks to build sight words. You may place the rocks in water for sensory play.
- Play Connect Four. Write sight words on Connect Four pieces. You can use labeling dots to write the words. Have students say the word before they place it inside the Connect Four game. If they connect four in a row, they win the game. Connect Four games can be found on Amazon for about \$8.
- Use yarn to manipulate letter shapes and build sight words.
- Graffiti write sight words on a whiteboard or poster board. You can repeat the words more than once. Have your student take turns finding and marking out sight words that you call out to them.
- Play hangman with sight words. You may order a Melissa and Doug hangman board from Amazon for around \$7. Let your student pick a sight word from your current list and try to guess their word.
- Write words on a dry erase board. Have your student practice spelling by calling out the words and having them write on the dry erase boards.
- Use letter beads to build sight words on a pipe cleaner. .
- Sight word swat game. Spread sight words out on a table. Your child will swat the sight words with a fly swatter as you call them out.
- Build a hopscotch board on the playground and play hopscotch. Child tosses a pebble. Child says the word of where the pebble lands and jumps to that box.
- Cover a Twister board with sight words and play Twister using sight words.
- Create a Tic-Tac-Toe board and have students say sight word before they choose a spot to place their X or O.
- Play Go Fish. Double the set of ten of words and have your child ask a partner if they have a certain sight word. If they don't have the sight word, they need to "go fish" and pull out another word from the center pile. I would start with 5 cards.
- Make a Match: Double the sight word cards and turn face down on a table. Have your child turn over two cards and read the words to find a match.
- Write sight words on Ping-Pong balls. Let your child say the sight word and practice tossing the balls into a bucket.
- Jenga: Write sight words on Jenga pieces. You can find small Jenga pieces at the Dollar Tree. Have your child say the sight words as they pull out each Jenga piece. Play until the tower falls down.
